Religious Education Policy

'The mission of schools and teachers is to develop an understanding of all that is true, good and beautiful.' Pope Francis

Rationale of Religious Education:

The primary purpose of Catholic Religious Education is to come to know and understand God's revelation which is fulfilled in the person of Jesus Christ. We place RE at the core of our curriculum here at St. Mary's. Everything we do is reflected in our mission statement. *'With Christ as our guide, we let our light shine.'* We believe that Religious Education helps pupils to know and experience the meaning of Christ's revelation in his or her own life and within the life of the community, the church. 'Religious Education is never simply one subject among many, but the foundation of the entire educational process.' (Expectations of Religious Education in Catholic Schools, Bishops' Conference of England and Wales, January 2000.)

Aims and Objectives

Curriculum religious education in Catholic schools aims to promote:

- Knowledge and understanding of Catholic faith and life;
- Knowledge and understanding of the response of faith to the ultimate questions about human life, its origin and purpose;
- The skills required to engage in examination of and reflection upon religious belief and practice. The objectives of curriculum religious education in Catholic schools are:
- To develop knowledge and understanding of the mystery of God and of Jesus Christ, of the Church, and of the central beliefs which Catholics hold;
- To develop awareness and appreciation of Catholic belief, understanding of its impact in personal and social behaviour and of the vital relationship between faith and life, life and faith;
- To encourage study, investigation and reflection by the pupils;
- To develop appropriate skills: for example, ability to listen; to think critically, spiritually, ethically and theologically; to acquire knowledge and organise it effectively; to make informed judgements;
- To foster appropriate attitudes: for example, respect for truth; respect for the views of others; awareness of the spiritual, of moral responsibility, of the demands of religious commitment in everyday life and especially the challenge of living in a multi - cultural, multi - faith society.

Religious Education in the Classroom

Since the total curriculum in our school is based on the values of the Gospel and because we see all education as revealing the mystery of God, we recognise two aspects of Religious Education in the school:

Implicit, or unstructured Religious Education- those opportunities which arise in the course of a school day to lead pupils through curriculum content or through relationships to a religious understanding of their implications. It is the policy of this school to use such opportunities as they arise.

Explicit, or Curriculum Religious Education – those timetabled or planned periods of time given to explicit consideration of Religious Education in the classroom. In line with the Bishop's recommendation, it is the policy of this school to give 10% of the timetable to the teaching of R.E in FS, Key Stage 1 and Key Stage 2.

Curriculum time allocation: 10% of curriculum time is allocated to Religious Education. This does not include Collective Worship.

Programme of Study: Come and See (recommended by the Diocese)

To fulfil our aims and Objectives we use the Come and See programme to adhere to the Curriculum Directory, as prescribed by the Diocese. The aim of this programme is to explore the teachings of Jesus through Scripture, allowing children to explore these through different parables, Gospels and stories.

During the Advent Term, we focus on the following:

- Domestic Church Family
- Baptism/Confirmation Belonging
- Advent and Christmas Loving

In the Lent Term, our focuses are:

- Local Church Community
- Eucharist Relating
- Lent and Easter Giving

In the final term, the Pentecost term, we focus on:

- Pentecost Serving
- Reconciliation Inter-relating
- Universal Church World

We celebrate Other Faiths, with a focus on Judaism each academic year for one week and then explore Hinduism, Islam and Sikhism on a three-year rolling programme.

Preparation for Sacraments

The celebration of Sacraments is central to the Catholic faith tradition. Coming to understand Sacraments is not a simple process but a complex interaction of a great variety of experiences and celebrations in which children take part during the years they spend in the Primary school. For many children this will include their first celebrations of Communion and Reconciliation. Knowledge about

and understanding of these Sacraments is an integral part of Come and See. The children's learning in school about the sacraments through the Come and See programme will support catechesis offered at home and in the Parish. Work begins in the Foundation Stage and the opportunity for depth and development of this occurs throughout Key Stage 1 and Key Stage 2. This allows parents, teachers, priests and catechists in each local situation, great flexibility in making decisions about when and how children receive these Sacraments.

In the Advent Term each academic year, the children explore the Sacraments of Baptism and Confirmation:

- EYFS Welcome
- Year 1 Belonging
- Year 2 Signs and Symbols
- Year 3 Promises
- Year 4 Called
- Year 5 and Year 6 explore the Sacraments of Marriage and Ordination in their topics:
- Year 5 Life Choices
- Year 6 Vocation and Commitment

During the Lent Term, the children investigate the Sacrament of the Eucharist and in the Pentecost Term, we focus on the Sacrament of Reconciliation and saying sorry.

Teaching of other Religious Faiths

Although the majority of teaching time is spent on Christianity through the Catholic tradition, there is also a planned programme of study to include the exploration of other faiths. We celebrate Other Faiths, with a focus on Judaism each academic year for one week and then explore Hinduism, Islam and Sikhism on a three-year rolling programme.

Assessment, Recording and Reporting

Each term, information is given to parents via the curriculum information sheet, outlining the content of the term's topics and highlighting any feast days that fall within the term, including Holy Days of Obligation. In line with our whole school policy on assessment, each teacher assesses the children they teach every term. This assessment is reported to and analysed by the RE Subject Lead. Parents are informed about their child's achievement, effort and progress in Religious Education at Parents' Evening in the Lent Term and in their child's End of Year report. At the end of the academic year, information is shared with the child's next Class Teacher.

Policy Monitoring and Review

This policy is monitored by the Executive Head teacher and RE Lead. It is evaluated and reviewed by the whole school staff and governors every two years.
